

Characters

Many years ago you could enter the Turkey Trot Half-Marathon on the day of the race but these days the race is sold out a long time before raceday. One of the features of that race was always the runner who took his dog along with him and he would always run with a bib on with the number K9. Reminds you of Mark and Leo today. They were quite quick as well. Another race I remember was from Ashby Leisure Centre. I was jogging along pretty well when suddenly one of the runners came by me pushing a pushchair with his young child inside it. He obviously wanted to do the race but couldn't find a baby sitter, but it came as a big surprise to me on the day.

Raced against a few footballers over the years. Lord Birchenall always did the Rothley 10k

until age took over. Jon Sammels ex Arsenal and City was a member of OWLs for many years doing all the League races. Muzzy Izzet did the Hungarton race one year. In the last but one year of Filbert Street I was lucky enough to do the Charity Run with Alan Birchenall around the pitch before the start of the final home game of that season. Tottenham were the visitors that day and a few of their players joined in and mixed in with the runners. Paul Ramsey and Ali Mauchlan two old City Stars joined in along with Roy Cropper of Roys Rolls fame in Coronation Street. It was certainly an unforgettable experience especially as you neared kick off time and the Kop began to fill up and they gave the runners a terrific ovation.

Met some terrific characters within the club over the years. I could mention a lot of these runners but have decided against that because I would almost certainly leave somebody out and that could cause myself some heartbreak. I have loved meeting and running with everybody within the club and I dearly wish that I could run with you all in the coming years. Problem is you are all faster than me now. On the Fell

Great Hucklow (6.2 miles/1115ft)

By some unfortunate quirk of scheduling, there was a choice of fell races less than 6 miles apart (obviously, they don't talk). Having tried the Peak Forest race last year, it was time to give Great Hucklow a go. The showers had been replaced by sunshine by the time we assembled for the start. I was joined by a group of Stilton Striders and a couple of other county runners, with those in the know promising 'a good race with a bit of everything'. When you know there's plenty of climbing to come, a downhill start is a bit like spending your wages before you've earned them. After half a mile or so, we were into the first climb and payback had begun. Unlike many races, which follow rights of way, much of this one was across private land

(something like 6 landowners had had to grant permission for the race to take place). For one section a path had been cut and strimmed through the undergrowth, making it quite a challenge just to stay upright. The strength of local support is illustrated by the fact that each year, one of the farmers dismantles part of a dry stone wall to allow runners through and then rebuilds it afterwards.

Over all, it was a proper challenge with the uneven ground every bit as sapping as the climbs. The post-race cup of water was supplemented by bananas and flapjack (the perfect pick me up) and we waited for the last of the county runners to finish. This took longer than expected because as he'd been running through bushes, a branch had caught his glasses and flicked them off. Unable to see to find them he'd had to begin a finger-tip search of the undergrowth. Fortunately he was able to continue after a following runner had come to his assistance.



I'd had my eye on doing a double by adding an afternoon race about 20 miles north, but a waterlogged parking field had put paid to that. We retired to a local café for tea and chip butties but I declined an invitation to the 'saltiest pub in the peaks', an establishment called the Three Stags Heads (3 stag skulls are displayed on the front), where a request for anything other than bitter is met by a death stare (and you thought Royston Vasey was fictional)! 69/155

Windmill Fell Race (5 miles/950ft)

One of the disadvantages of being a Leicestershire fell runner is the distance you are forced to travel to events. Whilst the Charnwood Hills Race and the Bradgate XC fit the bill, that's basically your lot. Kudos then, to Mark Lambell and West End Runners for adding a new event to the county calendar: the Windmill Fell Race. This low-key Wednesday evening event was limited to 100 entries but included all the essential elements; no frills, cheap entry, great atmosphere, nice scenery and some lung-busting climbs. Baz and Terry also managed to get their names on the list before the inevitable sell-out. Starting at the bottom of Mill Road in Woodhouse Eaves, the 5 mile course comprised two circuits of Windmill Hill and Broombriggs. The course was a proper challenge, spoilt only by the number of gates that had to be navigated. 29/90(DL), 51/90(TW), 56/90(CB)

Brooksie's Bash

Not a fell race but off-road and lots of fun, nonetheless. Ten miles of footpaths and tracks set in some lovely countryside on the Leicestershire/Derbyshire border. Organised by one of the Derby Runner clubs, Shelton Striders, the race was a fundraiser for Derbyshire MIND. Brian joined me for what proved to be an excellent event. Race HQ was in the very grand surroundings of Foremarke Hall, which is now the prep school for nearby Repton. The race started and finished in front of the Hall itself and it made a wonderful setting. The glorious weather just added to the sense of well-being as I warmed up around the pristine sports pitches.



This was my third race in 8 days and I was feeling a little weary. Of course the weariness only lasted for the first half mile and all thoughts of 'just a steady one' went out of the window (as they always seem to). The route, which took us past some colourful names like Hangman's Stone, Bleak House and Seven Spouts, included barely 400m of road. There was plenty of variety in the terrain and the views, plus some welcome shade as we ran through little patches of woodland. At the finish, I was able to bask in warm sunshine while Brian enjoyed the last section; the beaming smile on his face as he finished was the most eloquent of race reviews.

The race looks set to grow in popularity and both of us will be looking for it again next year. 32/144(DL), 132/144(BF)

Pilsley (6.1 miles/804ft)

Parking was in the car park of the Chatsworth Farm Shop, which sits on a hilltop opposite the estate. We registered under an event shelter on the small village green and the race started outside the front door of the pub. A damp evening became damper still shortly after we headed for the fields but it hardly matters once you've got going; it's much harder for the marshals, stuck in the middle of nowhere. The course was all runnable and not too challenging; the highlight being a long section through Chatsworth Park with the house visible on the other side of a shallow valley. The cattle weren't too impressed with the extra company but fortunately they did their stampeding just below us rather than trying to join in the race. The race concluded with a climb back up to Pilsley and a return to the village green. By now the rain was guite heavy, so I didn't linger to find out my finishing position. 59/191
